Dr. Cameron will speak about how the architecture of the brain is formed as brain circuits are built from the prenatal period until about 25 years of age, with the greatest burst of development occurring in the early years of life. Her talk will show how experiences interact with genetics to shape the brain circuits that children form and will use the rest of their lives for all that they do: speaking, thinking, emotional regulation, activities, problem solving. The impact of early life adversity on the development of brain circuits and how to help children strengthen brain pathways to promote resilience will be discussed. Dr. Cameron will focus on how this information can be made available to parents, childcare providers and others who work with children using hands-on engaging learning activities.

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Biographies

Kellie Alarcon is a Canadian native who recently relocated to Richmond. Since arriving in Richmond, Kellie has been working with the Virginia Infant and Toddler Specialist Network. In her role as an Infant and Toddler Specialist, Kellie provides technical support and training opportunities to early care providers. Kellie has focused her career on working with children and their caregivers for the past twenty years.

Beth Beals has 17 years of early childhood experience, 14 of those with Head Start. She began her Head Start career as a home visitor, then progressed through a variety of positions including ERSEA coordinator, mental health and disabilities coordinator, education manager, and regional manager. She is currently an Early Childhood Specialist (ECS) with ICF, supporting grantees in Region III and is serving on the Active Implementation Team for Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) for Region III TTA. Beth holds a BA in Early Childhood Education from Point Park College and a BS in Library and Information Science from the University of Pittsburgh.

Brandi Black Thacker, MA MSW, Director of Training, Technical Assistance, and Collaboration for the NCPFCE. She has served communities as educator, case manager, advocate, director, trainer, technical assistance specialist, and consultant for over 15 years. She began her career in the mental health field, supporting children ages five to twenty-one with serious emotional disturbances. After moving to Virginia, she became a Head Start Director where she served 138 children and families. Brandi advanced to a position within the Region III Head Start Technical Assistance system where she provided extensive, ongoing, individualized attention to grantees in each of the six states. She also worked on the monitoring contract where she assisted in updating the protocol using the Monitoring 360 approach, and subsequently trained Federal and review team staff on its implementation. As the Director of TTA and Collaboration, Brandi oversees the development of materials and delivery of all NCPFCE training and technical assistance nationwide.

El Brown is an educator, entrepreneur, author, and PhD student specializing in Early Childhood Education/Early Childhood Special Education at George Mason University. Prior to leaving the traditional classroom, El served as an Elementary and Early Childhood Educator in the United States, Japan, and South Korea. She is the founder of KinderJam, an Early Childhood Education care, enrichment, and training agency. Above all, El is the proud mother of an 12-yearold son on the autism spectrum, affectionately known as SuperDuperKid (SDK).

Judy Cameron PH.D. is a Professor of Psychiatry and the Clinical Translational Science Institute at the University of Pittsburgh. For 10 years she was a member of the MacArthur Foundation Research Network on Early Experience and Brain Development and she is currently a member of the National Scientific Council on the Developing Child and the Scientific Council of the Child Mind Institute. Research areas in Dr. Cameron's lab include the interaction between genetic factors and early life experiences on shaping behavioral development, identification of factors that lead to stress sensitivity versus stress resilience, and the interactions between physical health and mental health. Dr. Cameron's newest research initiative is Working for Kids: Building SkillsTM (www.workingforkids.com), which is a novel community-based program that teaches the fundamentals of brain development to those who work with children at a community level that includes games such as The First Pathways Game (www.firstpathwaysgame.com)

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which is freely available and provides activities that parents and children can play together to strengthen brain development. This initiative provides a community training program and is evaluating the effect of this intervention on child development as well as health. Working For Kids has won several innovation awards in Pittsburgh, as well as from the National Science Foundation.

Freda Carter has over 16 years' experience consulting in 11 regions out of 12 to include HS, EHS, FCCH, AIAN, ARRA, EHS-CCP, home-based and pregnant moms. And her experience as a federal reviewer for eight consecutive years has led her to facilitate customized mock reviews for programs resulting in positive outcomes. She has worked with grantees from the east coast to the west on the Six Strategies of Active Supervision, Environmental Health and Safety, Playground Safety, Medication Administration Training, Child Abuse and Neglect, Diversity in the Workplace and Challenging Behaviors, to name a few. Additionally, she is also a Registered Dietitian.

Melissa Carter has been a licensed teacher in both New York and Virginia, holding a dual certification in Elementary Education and Secondary Social Sciences. She spent 15 years as a classroom teacher, teaching in both public and private institutions. In addition, Melissa has served as a clinical teacher, alternative education coordinator, and has served on committees for the VDOE. Melissa served as the Director of a child care center, and as the Staff Development Coordinator for the ARC of the Piedmont. Since 2015, Melissa has served as the Education, Disability, and Mental Health Manager for MACAA Head Start. Currently, she is working on becoming a Certified Child and Adolescent Trauma Professional through the International Association of Trauma Professionals.

Mark Colaw has 23 years of experience as a Head Start Director in WV and MD. During his tenure as a Head Start Director Mark has been successful in building partnerships at the local level that has resulted in expanded services for children and families participating in Head Start and Early Head Start programs. One particular project included creating access to Head Start services for 20 children and families living in a rural, unserved community. A unique component of this plan was the construction of a 3,000 square foot Head Start Center and playground through a partnership with the local Habitat for Humanity. Mark also brings with him knowledge of the Maryland State Initiatives in Early Head Start- CC Partnerships. His areas of expertise include program management systems, governance, ERSEA, self-assessment, on-going monitoring, and strategic planning.

Jennifer Edwards In May 2015, our family was changed forever. While on an elementary school field trip, our youngest son (age 6) had a severe, anaphylactic reaction after eating a bite of a protein bar. After an anxiety-filled ambulance ride, several doses of epinephrine, and a 5-hour ER stay, his reaction subsided. We took him to see a local allergist to determine the cause of his reaction, and testing revealed he has a severe allergy to all tree nuts. We thought avoiding foods with tree nut ingredients would be sufficient, but as we did more research, we discovered that a reaction can be triggered by eating foods that are merely processed in a facility that also handles tree nut products. As a result, we carry EpiPen's and Benadryl wherever we go. Since our society revolves around food, we struggle every day with managing his food allergy - whether it is checking with the chefs at restaurants to ensure there is no tree nut contamination or planning ahead to bring nut-free food items he can eat at birthday parties and other events that have food of unknown sources. His condition has brought much stress and anxiety to keep him safe, to

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ensure we minimize the number of reactions and trips to the ER and to make him feel included in activities (such as swim team pizza party or a school holiday celebration) that others take for granted. Out of the need to help improve the quality of life for our family and everyone who lives with food allergies, Faedadal LLC. was born.

Bethany Geldmaker is currently a program consultant in the Office of Family Health Services at the Virginia Department of Health and has been in this position for over ten years. Her current job involves responsibility for early childhood state systems building, integrating service delivery, policy development, evaluation and finance. Prior to that, she held a variety of administrative, teaching and research positions. Bethany received her B.S.N. in nursing from the University of South Florida, her Masters from the University of Virginia and a PhD from Virginia Commonwealth University. She has received a number of awards including Outstanding Young Women; Outstanding Achievement in the Research Awards Competition, Sigma Theta Tau International Conference; and the Martha Borlick Research Award for her dissertation. She was a State Early Childhood Policy Leadership Fellow, National Governor's Association and Zero To Three, October 2003-May 2005.

Rochelle Green is the Trainer Supervisor for Virginia's immunization registry, VIIS (Virginia Immunization Information System). Her primary responsibility is to oversee the training activity of the five VIIS Trainers who train medical facilities and schools across the state of Virginia. Rochelle has worked for the Virginia Department of Health in the Division of Immunization for almost fifteen years and has held the following positions: Division Secretary, Program Specialist for the Virginia Perinatal Hepatitis B Program, Vaccine Management Specialist for the Virginia Vaccines for Children (VVFC) Order Center and Southeast VIIS Field Trainer for the immunization registry. She holds a BS in Business Administration from Virginia State University.

Bill Huebner has over 38 years working with Head Start, primarily in management, program operations, T/TA, and at the state level (Head Start State Collaboration Offices in WV and PA). HS Collaboration Office positions were located within upper levels of state government and included major work in facilitating Head Start, Child Care, and State-funded Pre-K partnerships. Bill's T/TA experience was through federal contracted positions, Migrant Head Start, and as a private consultant. His areas of expertise include program management systems, governance, ERSEA, self-assessment, on-going monitoring, and strategic planning. Bill has a BS in Elementary Education from California University of Pennsylvania and has done graduate work in Education, Music, and Child Care Administration.

Deirdre Kane is a Registered Dental Hygienist who practices clinical dental hygiene in Northern Virginia. Ms. Kane provides oral health care to patients of all ages, and divides her time between a pediatric practice, a general family practice, and a retirement/skilled nursing care facility. In addition to a degree in Dental Hygiene, Ms. Kane holds a Bachelor in Business Administration from James Madison University, and is currently enrolled in a Master of Public Health program at George Mason University which she expects to complete by the end of 2019. Ms. Kane has served as the Head Start Liaison for the Northern Virginia Dental Hygienists' Association for the past three years, working to educate young children and their families about the importance of oral health. She has served as the Head Start Liaison for the Virginia Dental Hygienists' Association for the past year, as well as the Virginia Dental Hygienist Liaison for the National Center on Early Childhood Health and Wellness.

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Genevieve C. King, MA CSAC is the President for the Virginia Medication Assisted Recovery Programs comprising of 40 clinics. She is also the Asst. Regional Director for Pinnacle Treatment Services and the Executive Director of Leesburg Treatment Services. Genevieve has been a part of the recovery story for the past 10 years for hundreds of patients and the service providers who care for them.

As the 5th kid out of 7 children she loves family! Everything that is about the family and how the culture, economics, medical, and social influences is of interest to her. Raised between a brother struggling with addiction, a brother who was selling drugs, and a sister diagnosed with a terminal illness, Genevieve has used her story to be one of hope and recovery. This story about her family changed her perspective for life and has influenced her treatment philosophy. As a certified substance abuse counselor Genevieve meets her family's where they are at and provides treatment for the whole system. Utilizing humor, culture, faith, and support systems that are dear to the patient have been a platform for communicating a need for treatment in a time of crisis.

Genevieve's masters in Leadership is the cornerstone to assist parents, patients, and treatment providers to lead their loved ones into a healthier life. The foundation of every encounter is based on the hope for success in recovery.

Genevieve specializes in speaking to drug courts, churches, leadership teams, and community providers about the tension of addiction as a disease or moral failure in our community and families. Which category are you in? Come and explore your own thoughts about the challenges of opioid dependence and the impact it has had on our families during this presentation.

Kathleen Murphey is an Early Childhood Specialist with the Head Start Region III Training and Technical Assistance Network: she has provided T/TA to Head Start and Early Head Start programs in Region III since 2005. Kathleen has served as a content specialist for disabilities and mental health services, and more recently as an early childhood specialist, supporting Head Start programs in building sustained quality enhancement processes into their early education systems. Prior to her work in training and technical assistance, Kathleen directed preschool education, therapeutic play, and creative arts programs for children with a focus on children with physical and developmental disabilities. Kathleen has a B.S. in Early Childhood Education from Temple University and an M.S. in Child Development from the University of Pittsburgh.

Joe Preece has 17 years' experience in the Head Start/Early Head Start community. He worked in a local program for 8 years as a Family and Community Partnership Specialist and Infant and Toddler Specialist before moving into the Head Start Training and Technical Assistance (T T/A) system. While in the T T/A system, he has conducted numerous trainings around the country on a myriad of early childhood topics. Mr. Preece also served as chair of the 2012, 2013, 2014, and 2015 Birth to Three Institute national conferences while at the Early Head Start National Resource Center. Currently, he is an Early Childhood Specialist with ICF providing expert training and technical assistance to Head Start programs in West Virginia and Virginia. Mr. Preece has a Bachelor's of Social Work and BA in Early Childhood Education from Concord University, a MS in Strategic Leadership from Mountain State University, and an Ed.S in Educational Leadership from Liberty University.

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Alexandra Rosenblatt is the founder of Grants Counsel, which provides training, consulting and legal services to Head Start agencies.

Alexandra works with Head Start agencies throughout the grant life cycle: drafting and reviewing policies and procedures, advising on compliance, and advocating for them in OIG investigations, agency appeals, federal court litigation, and other grant-related disputes. Alexandra also provides training on compliance and best practices. She developed an innovative training format focused on nurturing networks of Head Start professionals to identify best practices and opportunities for innovation.

Alexandra graduated from the University of Virginia School of Law in 2006. Prior to founding Grants Counsel, Alexandra was a partner at Feldesman Tucker Leifer Fidell.

Marshall Vogt is a native of Richmond, Virginia, Marshall Vogt serves as the Epidemiologist for the Virginia Department of Health's Division of Immunization. In this capacity, he is responsible for statewide oversight of vaccine preventable disease surveillance and disease control activities, and programs that focus on the collection and analysis of immunization coverage rate data as well as adolescent immunization quality improvement.

Marshall received his Bachelor of Science in Biology from the University of Mary Washington in Fredericksburg, VA and earned his Masters of Public Health with a concentration in Epidemiology from the University of Georgia. Prior to his current position, Marshall held jobs in both local and state public health as well as in hospital infection prevention and also completed a Council of State and Territorial Epidemiologists (CSTE) Applied Epidemiology Fellowship.

Darryl Williams was born in Richmond, Virginia and was raised in eastern Henrico County. He is a graduate from Varina High School and obtained his Bachelor of Arts degree in Mass Communications from Virginia State University in 2002. He has two sons, ages twelve and fourteen, who attend school in Henrico County.
